One of the best ways to become involved in research is to register with the Australian Parkinson's Disease Registry (APDR).

The Australian Parkinson's Disease Registry (APDR) is an initiative to establish and maintain a database of people with Parkinson's disease (PD) in Australia. Established in 2008 as the Victorian Parkinson's Research Registry (VPRR), it has now expanded interstate to become the APDR. Through growth it continues to provide a powerful platform for PD research

The registry and participating volunteers will be a vital source of information to improve understanding of the condition and will play an important role in improving treatments.
